## Rules Short Form

<b>Rule</b>	<b>Debatable?</b>	<b>Vote?</b>	<b>Interrupt Speaker?</b>	<b>Description</b>
<b>1.1 Point of Personal Privilege</b>	No	No	Yes	Used if there is something preventing a delegate's participation in the proceedings (cannot hear the speaker, lack of decorum, etc.)
<b>1.2 Point of Order</b>	No	No	Yes	Used to point out a misuse of the rules
<b>1.3 Right of Reply</b>	No	No	No	Used if a delegate's country or person has been specifically targeted in a speech
<b>1.4 Point of Parliamentary Inquiry</b>	No	No	No	Used to ask the chair a question regarding procedure during a committee session.
<b>1.5 Point of Information</b>	No	No	No	Ask a question of a speaker at the end of their speech (only if speaker has yielded to points of information, or failed to yield)
<b>2.1 Adjourn</b>	No	Majority	No	Closes the committee proceedings at the end of the conference
<b>2.2 Recess</b>	No	Majority	No	Motion to suspend proceedings until the next committee session
<b>2.3 Suspension of the Rules</b>	1 speaker for	Majority	No	Moves the body out of formal debate into informal debate; usually used to discuss new resolutions or crisis situations
<b>2.4 Caucus</b>	No	Majority	No	Motion to have a period of time in which to discuss issues less formally <i>2.4.a Moderated Caucus:</i> Mover must state purpose, length of caucus, and speaker's time; the Chair will call on all representatives wishing to speak <i>2.4.b Unmoderated Caucus:</i> Mover must state purpose and length of caucus; representatives are free to move about the room for the purpose of discussion during caucus
<b>3.2 Close Debate</b>	1 speaker for / 2 against	2/3 Majority	No	Motion to close debate and move into voting procedure
<b>3.6 Close Speaker's List</b>	1 speaker for / 1 against	2/3 Majority	No	Limits speakers list by closing it so no further representatives can be added to the list
<b>3.7 Reopen Speaker's List</b>	1 speaker for / 1 against	Majority	No	Motion in order as long as at least one country was on list when it was closed

<b>4.1 Division of the Question</b>	1 speaker for / 1 against	Majority	No	4.1.a Motion to vote on operative clauses of a resolution separately 4.1.b Proposes how to divide the clauses
<b>4.2 Roll Call Vote</b>	No	1/5	No	Motion to take votes in alphabetical order of country, with representatives voting “yes”, “no” or “abstain”
<b>5.1 Amend a Resolution</b>	No	Majority	No	5.1.a <i>Friendly Amendments</i> : If all sponsors verbally consent to an amendment, it shall be passed into the resolution. 5.1.b <i>Unfriendly Amendments</i> : If at least one sponsor does not consent to the resolution, the amendment moves into debating procedure. Debate alternates between speakers for and against the amendment; once debate is exhausted, it requires a simple majority for the amendment to pass.
<b>5.2 Introduce a Resolution</b>	No	20% of body as signatories	No	All resolutions must be submitted in writing to the Chair for approval before being placed on the floor for debate. Once a resolution has been approved and distributed to the body, it will be debatable only after one of the sponsors moves the resolution onto the floor during a formal speech. The Chair shall suspend the sponsors’ speaking time in order for the sponsor to read aloud the resolution and entertain <i>non-substantive</i> questions regarding the resolution.
<b>6.1 Change the Agenda</b>	1 speaker for / 1 against	Majority	No	Motion to change the order in which agenda items are discussed; must include specific changes proposed

*\*Note: On the Security Council, a majority is 9 votes, a 2/3 majority is 11 votes, and 1/5 or 20% of the body is 3 countries.*
